ToRs – "Follow the Money": Monitoring Report on the Use of AMIF Funding at National Level

I. Background

In order to respond to the unprecedented migratory developments in Europe in 2015/16, ECRE and UNHCR have joined forces through a strategic partnership to develop and promote discussions on the possible options for the future of the Common European Asylum System (CEAS). The partnership has included research on the EU's Asylum Migration and Integration Fund (AMIF).

AMIF aims to contribute, through financial assistance, to the efficient management of migration flows and to the implementation and development of a common EU approach to asylum and migration. AMIF reflects efforts to simplify and streamline the implementation of the EU budget in the area of home affairs, since it replaces three separate funding programmes that operated during the 2007-13 period.

The AMIF has **four common specific objectives**: 1) strengthening and developing the establishment of the **Common European Asylum System (CEAS)**; 2) supporting **legal migration** to the Member States in accordance with their economic and social needs and promoting the **effective integration** of third-country nationals; 3) enhancing **fair and effective return strategies** with a view to countering **illegal immigration**; and 4) increasing **solidarity and responsibility-sharing** between the Member States, with particular focus on those most affected by migration and asylum flows.

In 2017, ECRE and UNHCR produced a joint research report entitled "Follow the Money – Assessing the use of AMIF funding at national level". The report provided a critical analysis of the AMIF national programmes, with the following specific objectives:

- support the assessment of AMIF national programming due to be undertaken in the 2018 mid-term review;
- make recommendations for better management and use of AMIF funds during the remainder of the AMIF multiannual funding period; and
- provide input to assist the EC, MS and partners to develop European asylum, migration and integration funding instruments post-2020.

II. Objectives of the AMIF report - phase two

In 2018, ECRE and UNHCR will produce a follow up to their research. The objective of the report "Follow the Money – Phase II" will be to map and assess the implementation of AMIF funds distributed through the National Programmes. The scope of the research will also include implementation of the emergency measures and provide some detailed information on the situation in a selection of EU countries.

It will use the evidence from the mid-term review of the AMIF, which is due to take place in 2018 and will take into account the interim evaluation reports prepared by the EU countries on the implementation of their national programmes. The mid-term review report is to be submitted to the EP, the Council, the European Economic and Social Committee and the Committee of the Regions by 30 June 2018.

Further, the new report will include an analysis of the relevant funding instrument proposals that will replace or complement the current AMIF in the context of the new Multi Annual Financial Framework (MFF) of the EU for the period 2021-2027; the report will include recommendations for use during the negotiation process.

Methodology	The consultant will be assisted by 2 research assistants (1 from ECRE and 1 from UNHCR); the consultant will coordinate and manage the work of the assistants in close cooperation with UNHCR and ECRE;
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The consultant will undertake a dask research and dovelop a synthesis
The consultant will undertake a desk research and develop a synthesis on the basis of the national reports and the mid-term review published by the European Commission. In addition to the comparative overview, the consultant will develop a more detailed analysis of the situation in 4 countries to be selected on the basis of preliminary evidence
The consultant will conduct interviews with EU stakeholders (suh as DG HOME, EP), where appropriate with relevant national stakeholders, UNHCR country offices and ECRE members in relevant countries.
 The study will include the following detailed breakdown : How much spending by country; How much spending by objective; How much spending by recipient type – when available In addition to the quantitative aspect, where possible the study should include qualitative analysis of the effectiveness of programmes and the results that have been achieved.
For each AMIF objective, the report will map key problems and good practices, as well as commonalities and divergences between the countries of focus.
The report will also include recommendations and possible actions to be taken by national authorities during the implementation of the last phase of the AMIF programme (2019-2020).
It will include a detailed analysis of the legislative proposals for the next MFF together with evidence-based recommendations.
